


Study Guide Grade Level: 4



UNIT DESCRIPTION: The purpose of this unit is to explore how non-fiction literature is organized and how the writer through the purposeful use of historical facts and non-fiction structure, assists the reader in comprehending non-fiction literature.

The structures and features to be explored in this unit will include: Chronology, Comparison, Cause/Effect, Problem/Solution, Main Idea/Details, Charts, Graphs, Diagrams, Timelines, Photographs, Indexes, Glossaries, and Vocabulary.

SUGGESTED TIMELINE: Approximately 2 to 3 weeks

CLASS PERIOD: 45 to 60 minutes daily

ESSENTIAL OUESTIONS:

- 1. How does non-fiction literature differ from fiction?
- 2. How do authors organize and present information in non-fiction text to aid the reader in understanding the text?
- 3. How does understanding the author's choices in the use of certain text features and structures assist me as a reader?

TITLE SUMMARY: "As a woman living on the Missouri Frontier in the early 1800s, Olive Boone faced many challenges we cannot imagine today. While her husband was away on hunting and trading trips, she raised their fourteen children alone while also maintaining her family's farm. At the time, many people thought women were not as strong or as talented as men. But Olive Boone showed she was as good as any man. She helped her family survive and prosper on the dangerous American frontier."

UNIT TITLE: NOTABLE MISSOURIANS

GRADE LEVEL: 4

TITLE THEMES: settlement, wild west, frontier, farming, hunting, chores, immigrants, pioneers, exploration, hardship, women's rights, property rights, inheritance.

HISTORICAL RELEVANCE: This book deals with the growing American frontier in the early 1800s. During Olive's life, the United States of America was expanding. The Louisiana Purchase was made in the year 1803, and the result was the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Olive and her husband were among many brave people to travel west to establish homes. Olive represents the strong women who raised children and did all the chores on their settlements while their husbands were often away for weeks at a time.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

- 2. Why do you think this was such a dangerous time to be living in?
- 3. How do you think Olive felt as she traveled to Missouri?
- 4. Olive and Nathan had many problems in their new home. How did Olive respond to her floor problem? She bought a new rug. How have your responded to a problem in your life?
- 5. If you could have a job on the frontier, what would it be and why?
- 6. When Olive's husband Nathan became ill, he wrote up a new will and left everything he owned to Olive. What do you think Olive would have done if Nathan had not given her everything? How would she have survived?

- 2. How were boys and girls raised differently during this time?
- 3. Why were the Boones and Van Bibbers such good friends?
- 4. What did the governor of the St. Louis area do to try to get people to move to Upper Louisiana?
- 5. What is a pirogue? Describe the one Nathan made for his family.
- 6. What did Olive and Nathan eat during their journey?
- 7. What did Olive and Nathan trade to obtain their land on the banks of the Femme Osage Creek?
- 8. Describe Olive and Nathan's first home.
- 9. What is a sieve and how did Olive create her own?
- 10. What was Boone's Lick?
- 11. What is a loom and what did Olive use it for?
- 12. When did the Missouri Territory become a state in the Union?
- 13. Why did Olive and her family have to move in 1833?
- 14. What scenery did Olive see when she arrived at the new farm in Springfield?
- 15. Why were Olive's daughters angry with her at the end of her life?
